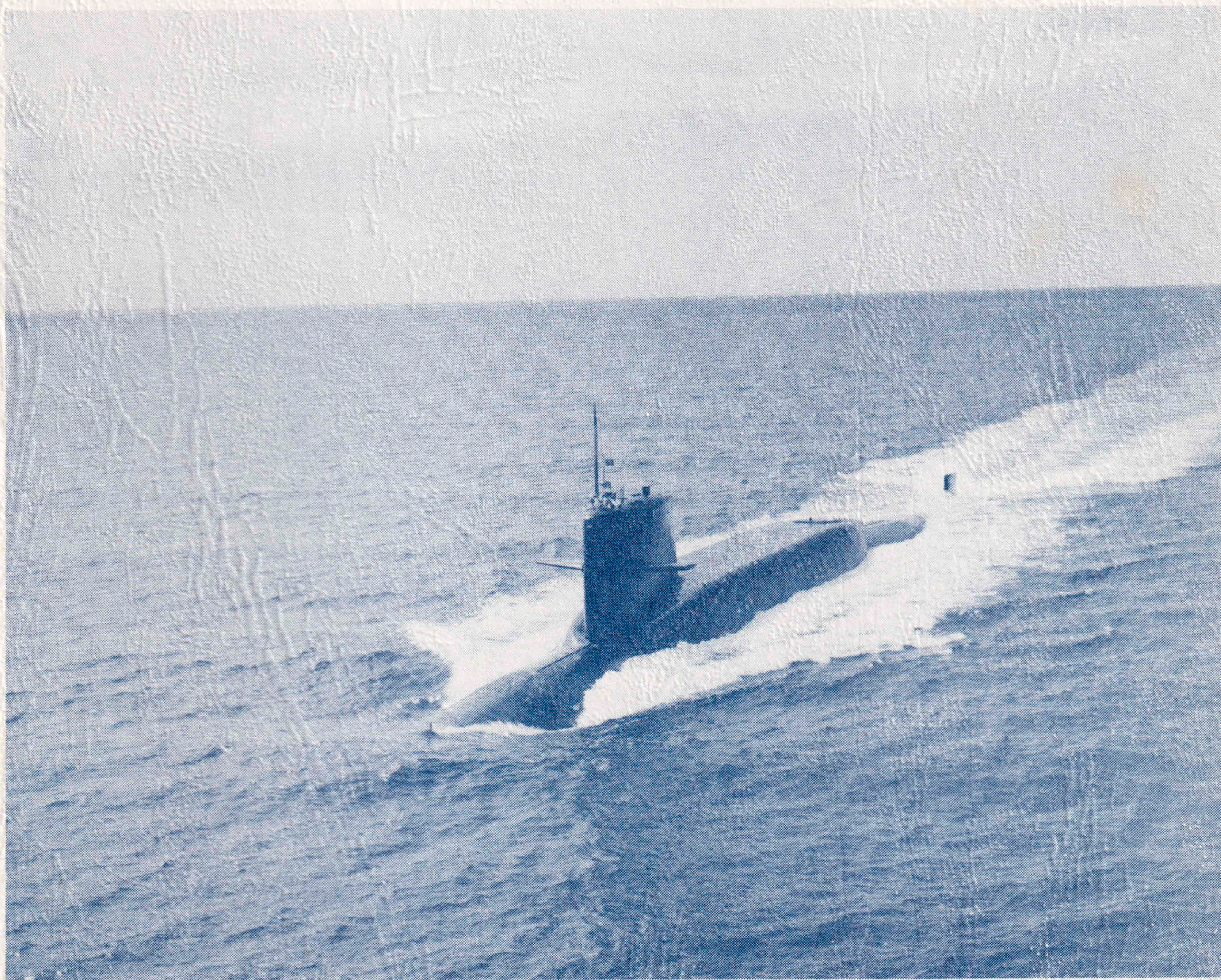

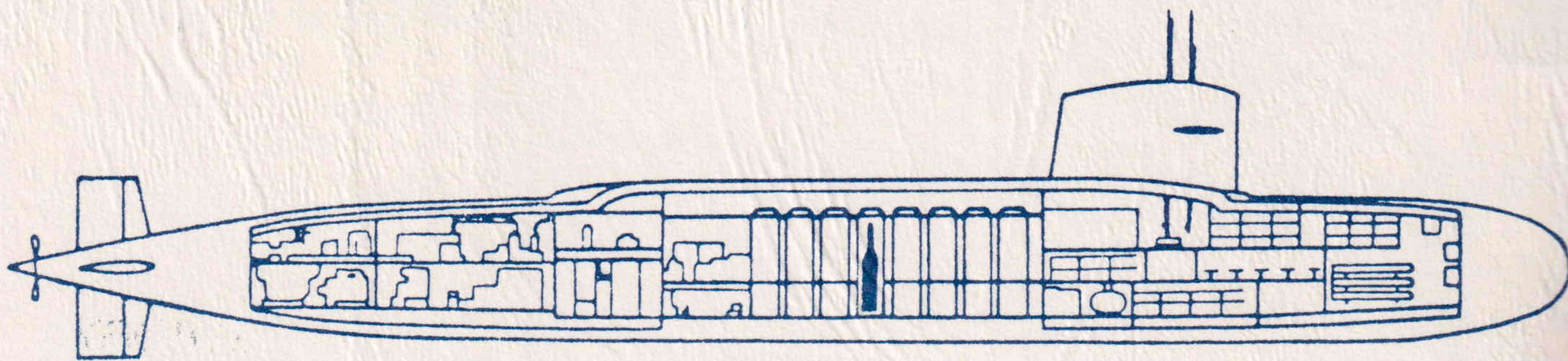

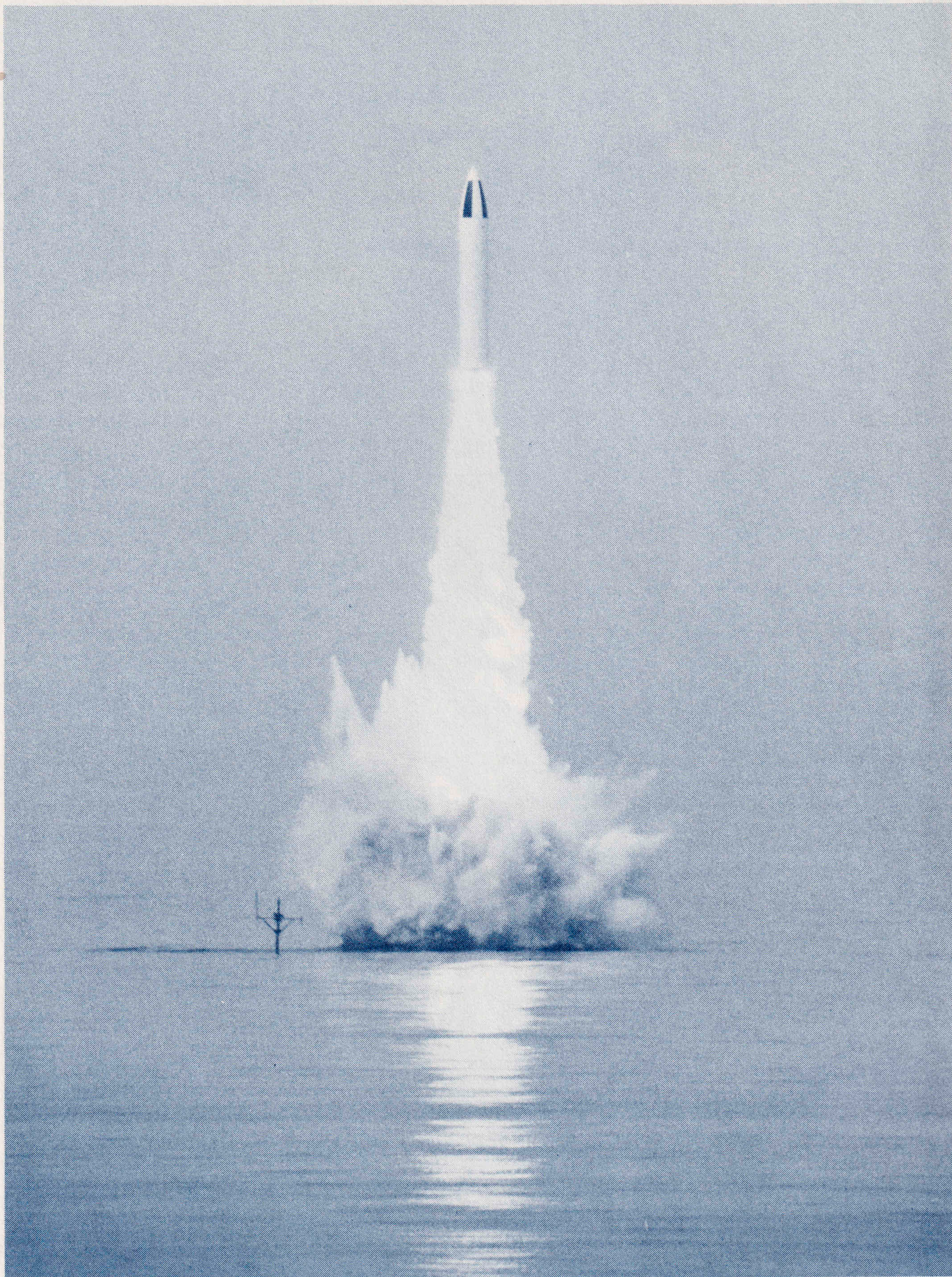

USS PATRICK HENRY (SSN599)

NAMESAKE

USS PATRICK HENRY is the second American fighting ship to be named in honor of the great statesman and "Voice of the Revolution," PATRICK HENRY. The first ship was a confederate sidewheel steamer that distinguished itself in the battle of Hampton Roads during the civil war.

FLEET BALLISTIC MISSILE SUBMARINE

USS PATRICK HENRY (SSBN599) was the second Fleet Ballistic Missile submarine to be constructed. Her keel was laid by the Electric Boat Division, General Dynamics Corporation, Groton, Connecticut, on 27 May 1958. She was launched and began her waterborne career on 22 September 1959, sponsored by Mrs. Leslie C. Arends. The ship was 381 feet long with a beam of 33 feet and a surface displacement of 5600 tons.

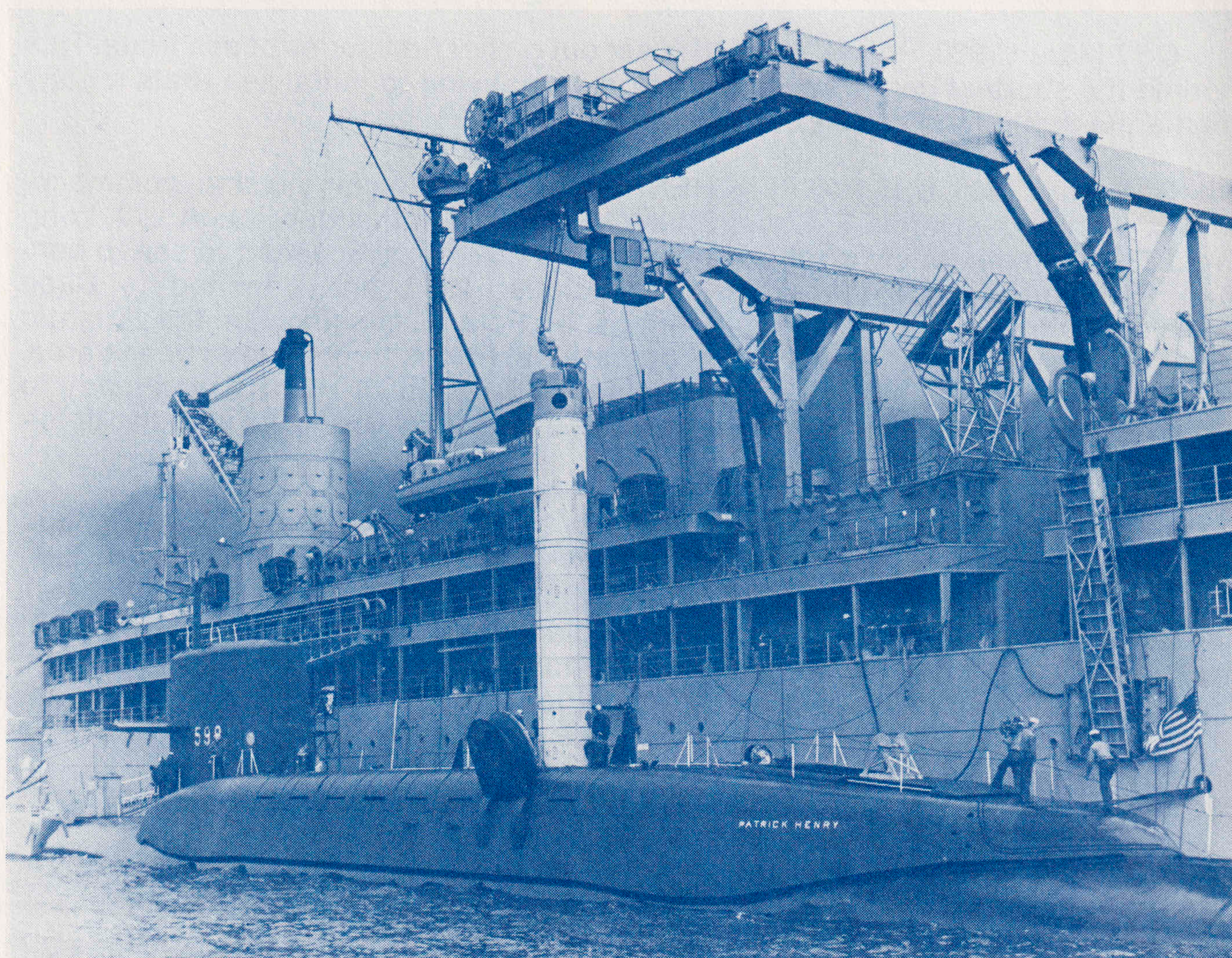
On 7 March 1960, PATRICK HENRY set out on her first series of sea trials. This marked the shortest construction time from keel laying to initial sea trials for any submarine built since the end of World War II.

On 9 April 1960, USS PATRICK HENRY was placed in commission, commanded by Commander Harold E. Shear (Blue Crew) and Commander Robert L. J. Long (Gold Crew). Immediately after commissioning, the ship proceeded to sea to conduct Preliminary Acceptance Trials. In August 1960, she transited to Cape Canaveral, Florida, for submerged firings of Polaris missiles on the Atlantic Missile Range. This included the first operational firings from a broad ocean area. After successful completion of this testing, USS PATRICK HENRY was ready to fulfill her design mission - to silently patrol the oceans of the world with the deterrent might of 16 Polaris missiles.

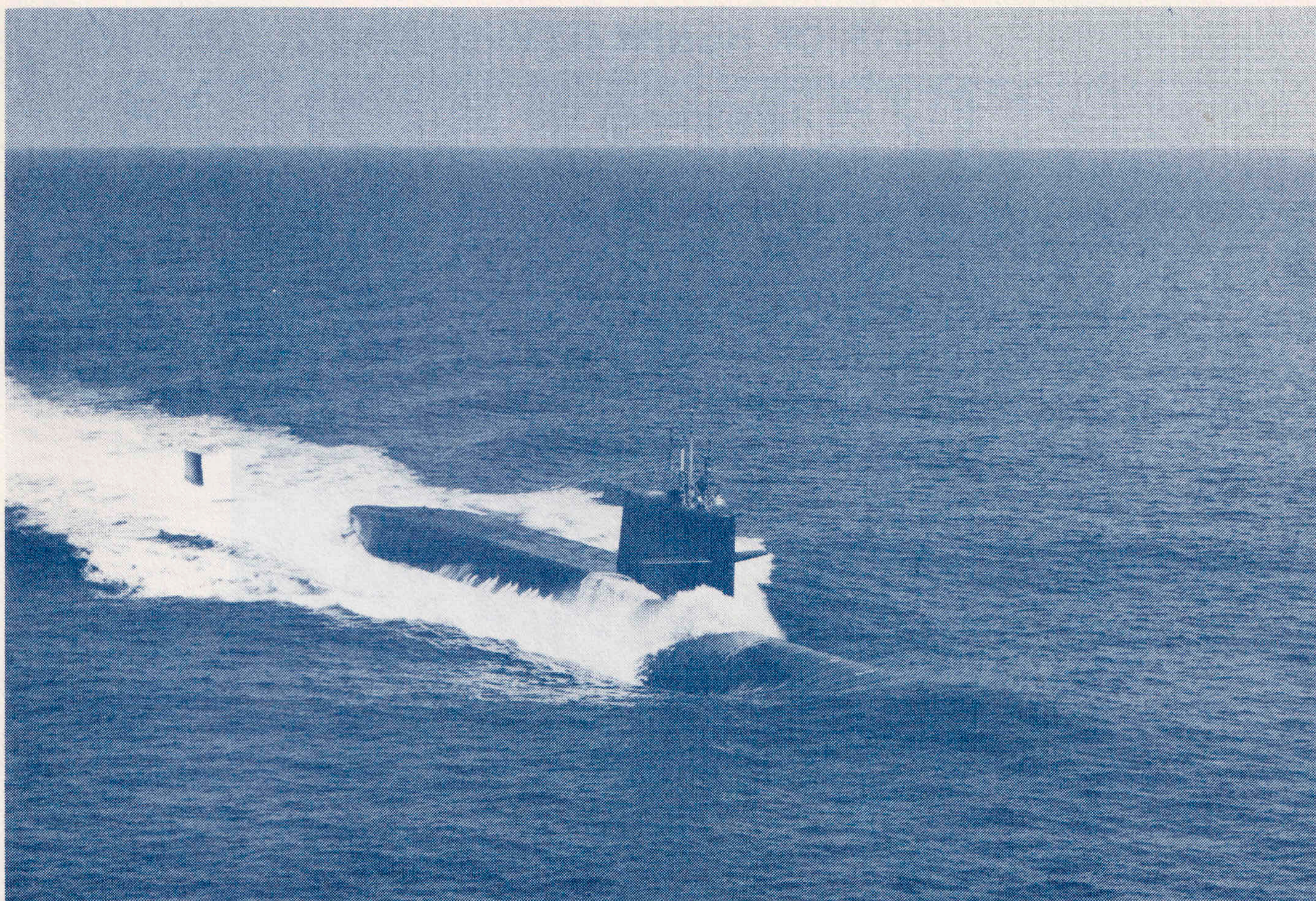
In December 1960, USS PATRICK HENRY departed from Groton, Connecticut, for *the first* of what would become *the most* strategic deterrent patrols for any submarine on record. When she arrived in Holy Loch, Scotland, after the first patrol, she had been submerged and completely isolated from the earth's atmosphere for a period of sixty-six days and twenty-two hours, setting a new record for continuous submergence under "sealed" conditions. PATRICK HENRY was the first Fleet Ballistic Missile submarine to enter the Holy Loch.

From 1961 to 1981, USS PATRICK HENRY completed fifty-nine strategic deterrent patrols, operating in both Atlantic and Pacific oceans, from Holy Loch, Scotland; Rota, Spain; and Guam, Marianas Islands, as a unit of Submarine Squadrons FOURTEEN, SIXTEEN, and FIFTEEN, respectively. She was overhauled and refueled three times, at Electric Boat, Groton, Connecticut; at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, Bremerton, Washington; and at Mare Island Naval Shipyard, Vallejo, California. During these overhauls her weapons system capabilities were upgraded to employ the A-3 Polaris missile and the MK 48 torpedo.

On 1 March 1968, USS PATRICK HENRY completed her 22nd patrol and the United States Fleet Ballistic Missile force's 500th. In 1969 on her 30th patrol, USS PATRICK HENRY passed the "quarter million" mark for miles of submerged operation. On 4 July 1976, USS PATRICK HENRY was the first U.S. ship to hoist the Bicentennial Jack at Guam, Marianas Islands.

FAST ATTACK SUBMARINE

In October 1981 in Bangor, Washington, USS PATRICK HENRY off-loaded her missiles for the last time. Her mission and designation were changed to that of an SSN, an attack submarine. Operating first from Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, as a unit of Submarine Squadron ONE and then from Bangor, Washington, as a unit of Submarine Squadron SEVENTEEN, she continued to serve the nation's defense in the Mid-Pacific and Eastern Pacific for a full two years. USS PATRICK HENRY entered Puget Sound Naval Shipyard on 1 October 1983 for inactivation.

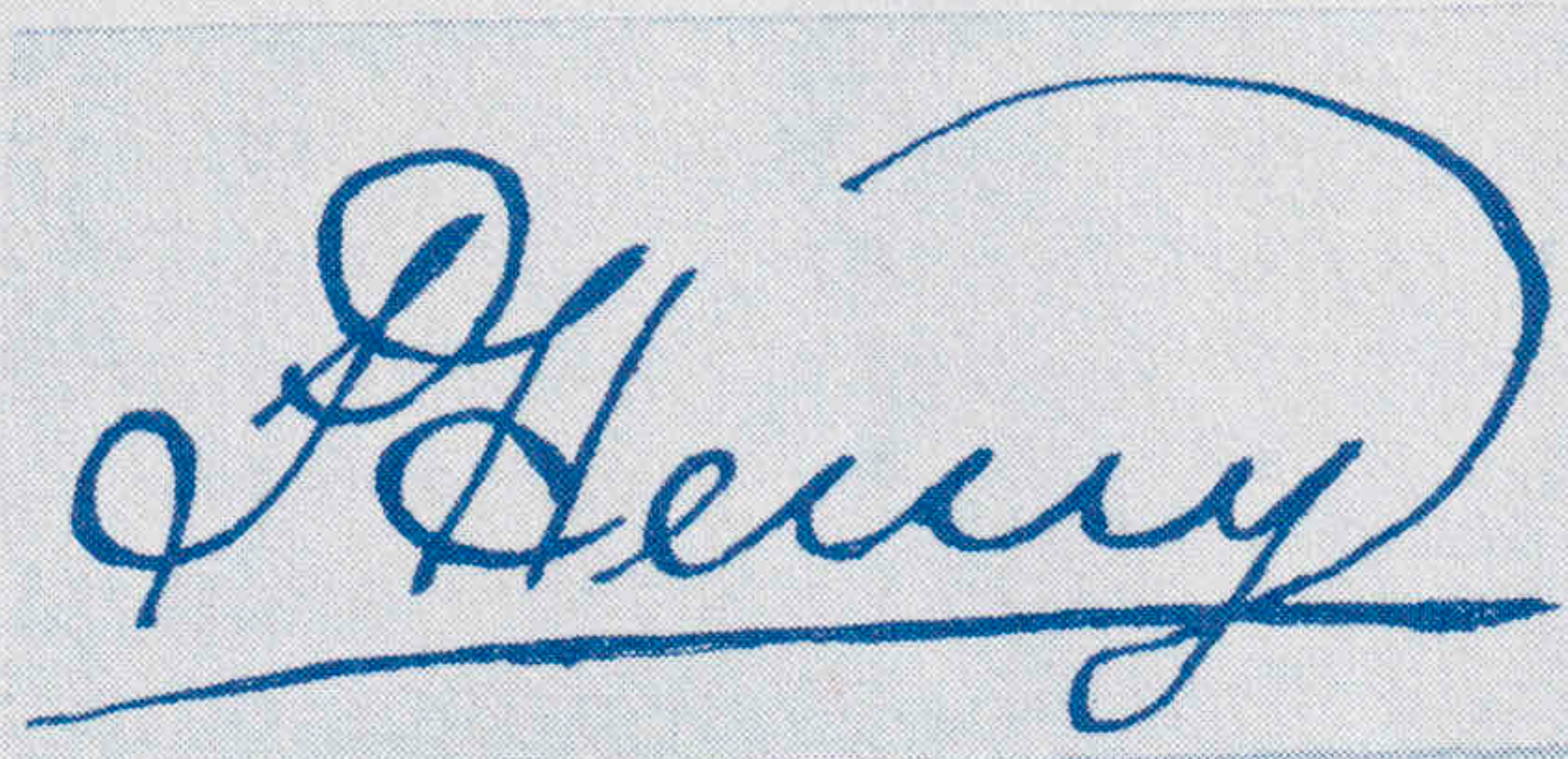
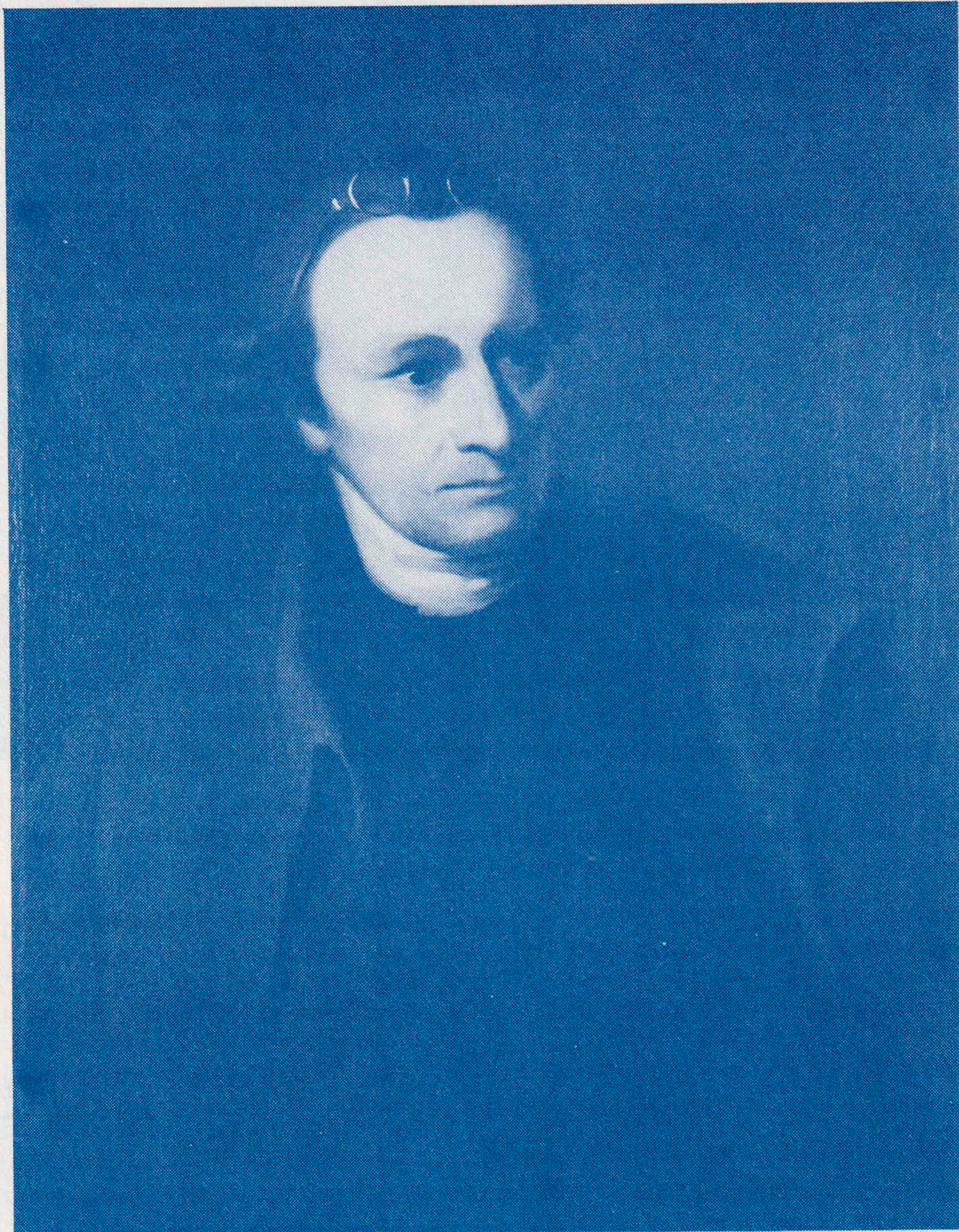
DISTINGUISHED SERVICE

Over her 24 years of service, USS PATRICK HENRY distinguished herself by earning the Battle Efficiency "E" for 1964, 1976, and 1981; the Engineering "E" for 1976, 1981, and 1983; the ASW "A" for 1975, 1976, and 1979; the Supply "E" for 1979, and the Communications "C" for 1983. She also earned the Marjorie Sterrett Battleship Fund Award in 1976 and earned Silver Anchor Awards for retention in 1976, 1980, and 1983. She logged 531,230 miles while operating submerged, equal to over 21.3 times around the world. Her 59 strategic deterrent patrols, representing more than 11 years submerged and undetected, stand as the record for all navies of all nations.

The patriot Patrick Henry gave much to win freedom and peace for his country; the ship PATRICK HENRY and her crews have given much to preserve that freedom and peace.

COMMANDER RICHARD E. FAST, U.S. NAVY

Commander Richard E. Fast graduated from Auburn University in 1964. Upon completion of Officer Candidate School and commissioning as an ensign, Commander Fast attended eighteen months of Submarine and Nuclear Propulsion Program Training. He then served in USS SCULPIN (SSN 590), USS NAUTILUS (SSN 571), and USS TUNNY (SSN 682). Commander Fast was the Executive Officer of USS JAMES K. POLK (SSBN 645) (Gold) and Commanding Officer of USS THOMAS A. EDISON (SSN 610). Commander Fast also completed tours on the staffs of the Nuclear Propulsion Training Unit, Idaho Falls, Idaho, and Commander Submarine Force Pacific, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Commander Fast is authorized to wear the Meritorious Service Medal with two Gold Stars, Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal, Navy Unit Commendation Medal, Meritorious Unit Commendation Medal, Navy Expeditionary Medal and National Defense Medal.

Commander Fast is married to the former Alice Rebecca Alverson of Hope Hull, Alabama. They have two children, Julie and Ed.

Commander Fast's next duty will be: Force Operations Officer, Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet.

COMMODORE ROGER F. BACON, UNITED STATES NAVY

Commodore Roger F. Bacon was raised in the Bremerton, Washington area, graduating from Bremerton High School in 1955. He attended the United States Naval Academy, graduating with distinction in June 1959. He was selected for promotion to Flag rank in January 1983.

Commodore Bacon served in USS ISHERWOOD (DD 520), his first sea tour, until 1960. Following Submarine School and Nuclear Prototype training at Idaho Falls, he reported to USS HALIBUT (SSGN 587) in 1961. While on board HALIBUT, Commodore BACON participated in five REGULUS missile deterrent patrols. His next assignment was in USS KAMEHAMEHA (SSBN 642) (Gold) as Engineer Officer during construction, shakedown and two POLARIS patrols. In 1969, Commodore BACON received a Master's Degree in Computer Science from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, California. During the period 1969 to 1972, he served as Executive Officer of USS HALIBUT (SSN 587). Commodore BACON commanded USS FLASHER (SSN 613) from August 1972 to January 1975. Under his command, USS FLASHER completed two deployments to the Western Pacific and was awarded the Battle Efficiency "E". Commodore BACON conducted three POLARIS patrols as Commanding Officer, USS PATRICK HENRY (SSBN 599) (GOLD) during the period February 1975 to May 1976. PATRICK HENRY was awarded the Battle Efficiency "E" and the MARJORIE STERRETT Battleship Fund Award during this period. Commodore BACON served as the Tactical Training Officer and Prospective Commanding Officer Instructor on COMSUBPAC Staff, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii from May 1976 to January 1979.

During the next two years, Commodore BACON served as Commanding Officer, USS HUNLEY (AS-31), the forward deployed submarine tender at the Fleet Ballistic Missile Site III, Apra Harbor, Guam. For service to fast attack and Fleet Ballistic Missile submarines during sixty-four refits, USS HUNLEY was awarded the Battle Efficiency "E", CINCPACFLT Golden Anchor Award, the SECNAV Energy Conservation Award and Meritorious Unit Commendation during his tour.

Commodore BACON was next assigned as Commander Submarine Squadron ONE from August 1980 to May 1982 in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. During this period 16 fast attack and Fleet Ballistic Missile submarines were assigned. Commodore BACON served as the Chief of Staff to Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet during 1982 and 1983. He is presently assigned as Director, Strategic and Theater Nuclear Warfare Division (OP-65) OPNAV.

Commodore BACON is married to the former Joan D. Darby of Walnut Creek, California. They have two children, Roger and Jennifer.

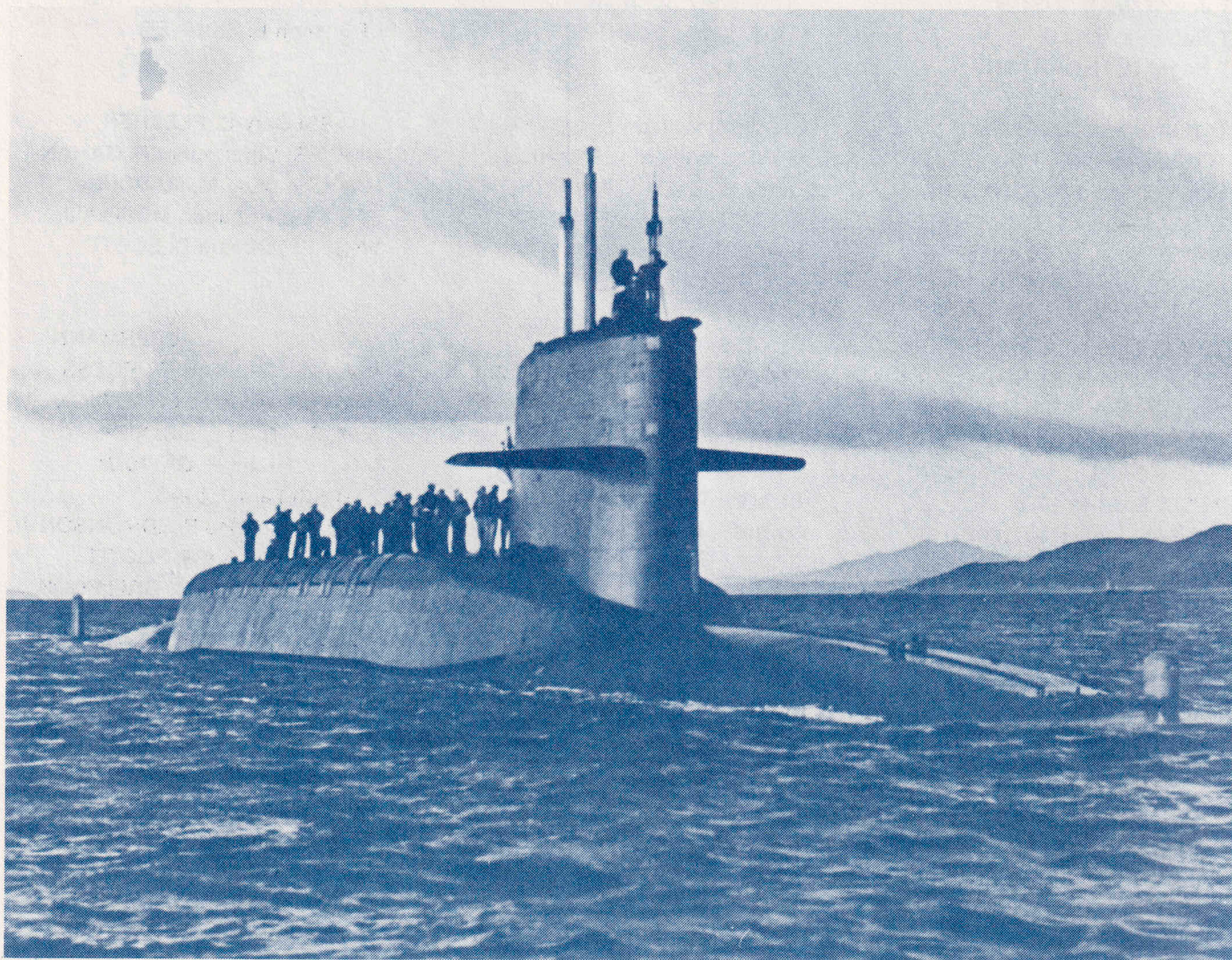

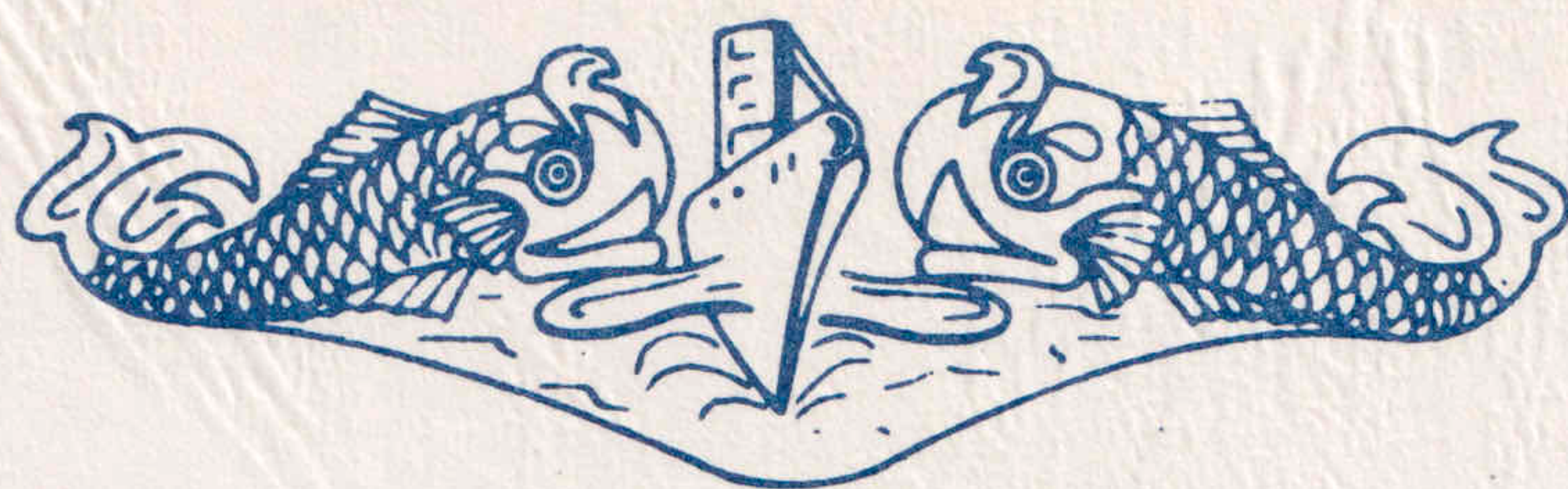

DECOMMISSIONING OF A NAVY SHIP

The decommissioning ceremony marks the retirement of a ship as a unit of the operating forces of the United States Navy. On 9 April 1960, when the order to commission this ship was given, a commissioning pennant was first hoisted on the sail. A pennant has flown there through 24 years of proud service. Today, when the commissioning pennant is hauled down for the final time, USS PATRICK HENRY (SSN599) will no longer be the responsibility of her commanding officer. Until this moment, he, along with the ship's officers and men, had the responsibility of making and keeping her constantly ready for any service demanded by our country in peace or war.

The commissioning pennant is said to date from the 17th century, stemming from an incident between the warring Dutch and English navies. In one particular engagement, Maarten Harpertszoon Tromp, the Dutch Admiral, hoisted a broom at his masthead to indicate his intention to sweep the English from the sea. The English Admiral then hoisted a horsewhip, indicating his intention to chastise the insolent Dutchman. Ever since that time, the narrow "coachwhip" pennant, symbolizing the original horsewhip, has been the distinctive mark of a man-of-war. This tradition of so designating ships of war has been adopted by all nations.

The modern United States Navy commissioning pennant is blue at the hoist with a horizontal red and white stripe at the fly and varies in length with the size of the ship. At one time, there were thirteen white stars in the blue field representing the original states but in 1933, seven white stars became standard. It is a naval custom that when the commissioning pennant is hauled down for the last time, it be presented to the commanding officer.
