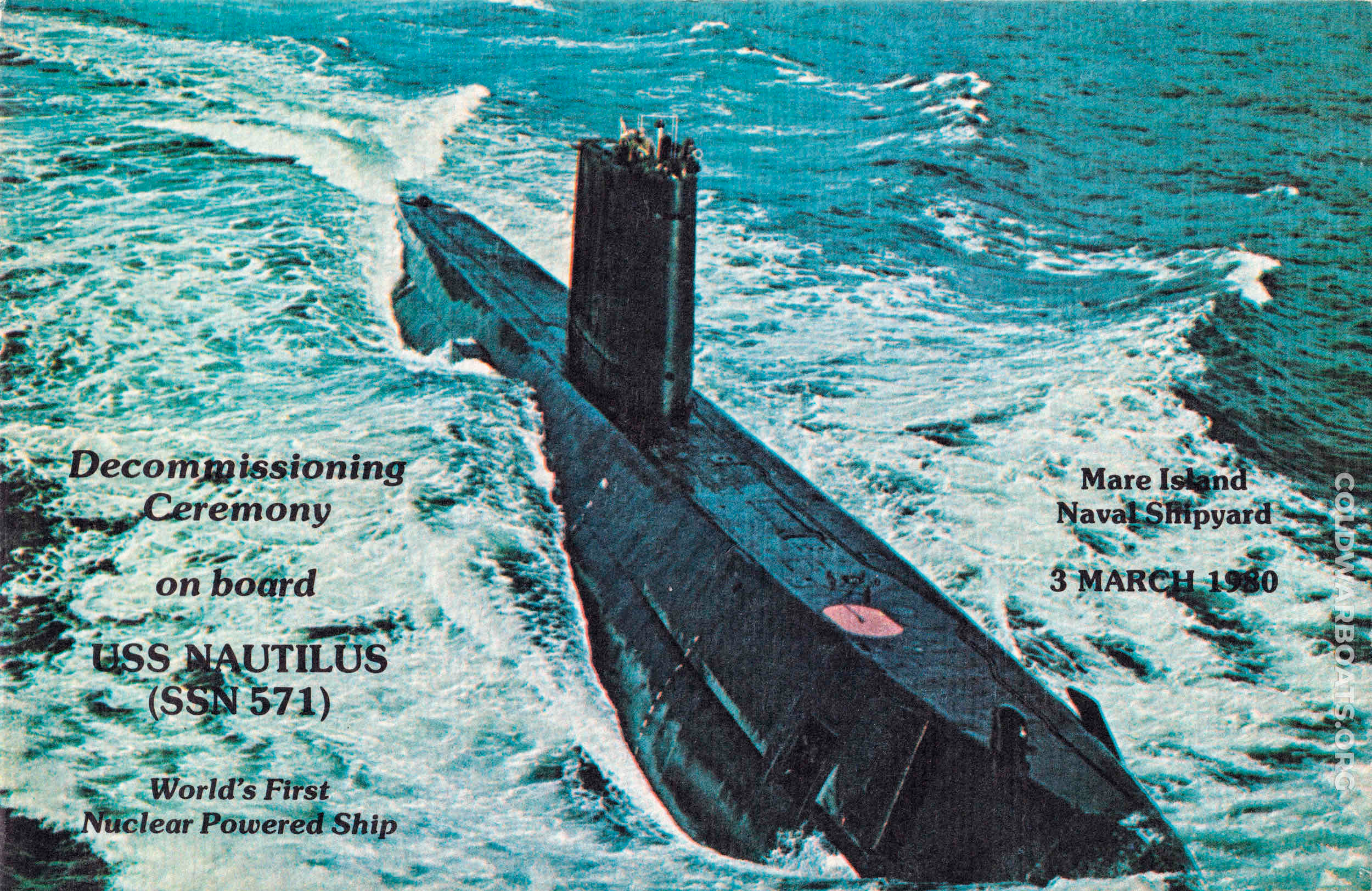

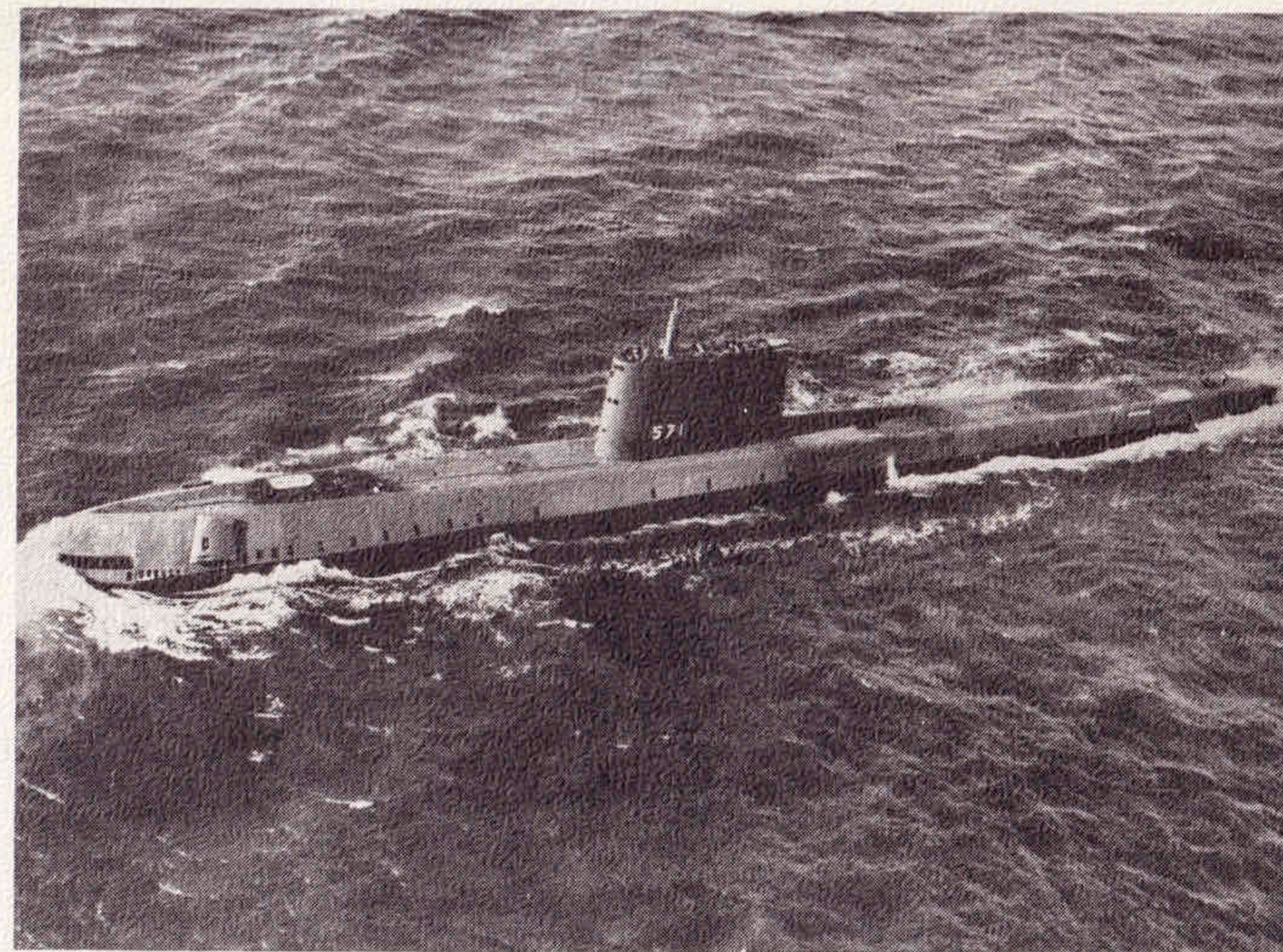
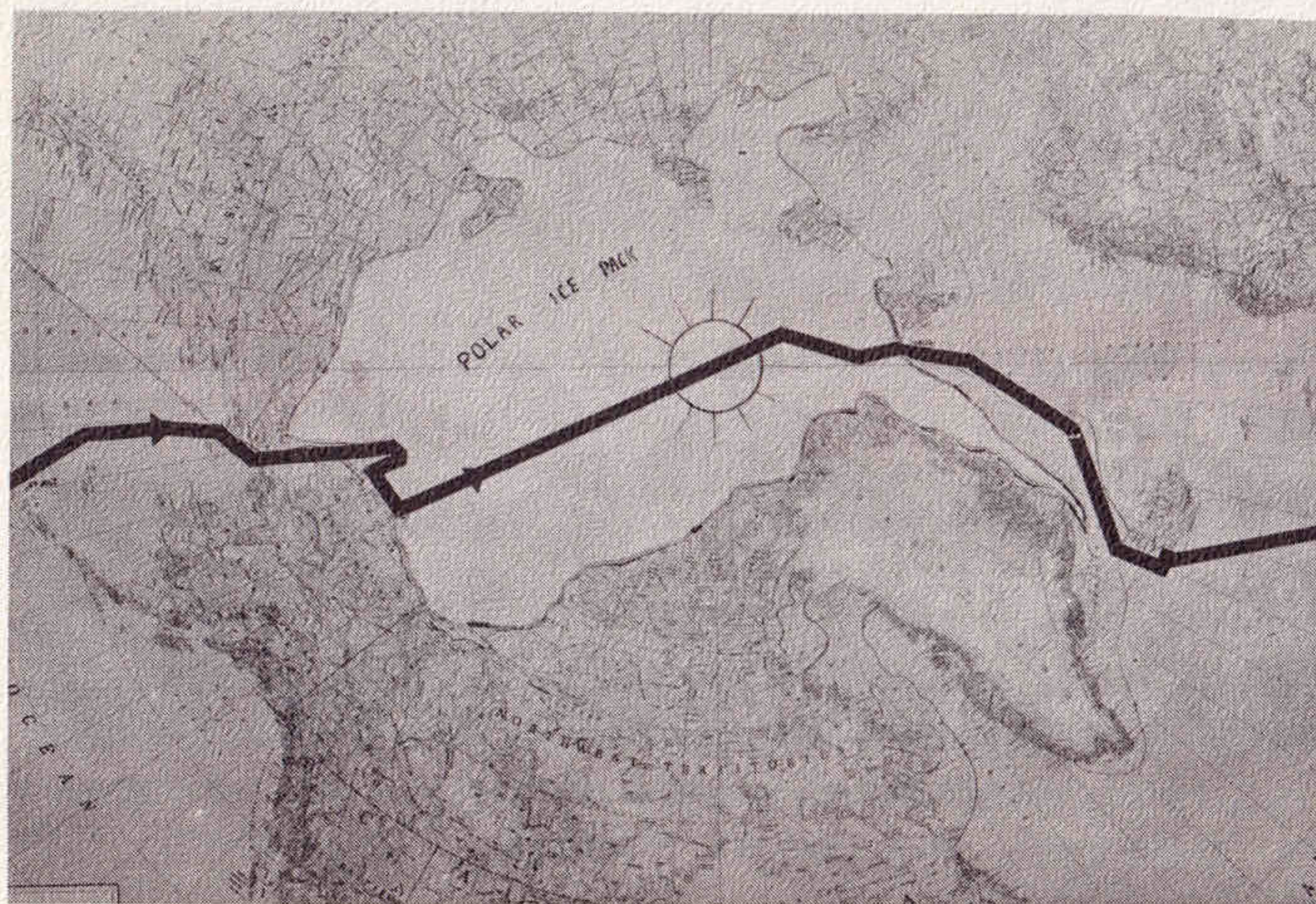
HISTORY OF USS NAUTILUS (SSN 571)

On June 14, 1952, President Harry S. TRUMAN chalked his initials on the keel of what was to become the world's first nuclear powered ship. Construction of NAUTILUS was made possible by the successful development of a nuclear propulsion plant by a group of scientists and engineers at the Naval Reactors Branch of the United States Atomic Energy Commission under the leadership of Captain (now Admiral) Hyman G. RICKOVER, U.S. Navy.



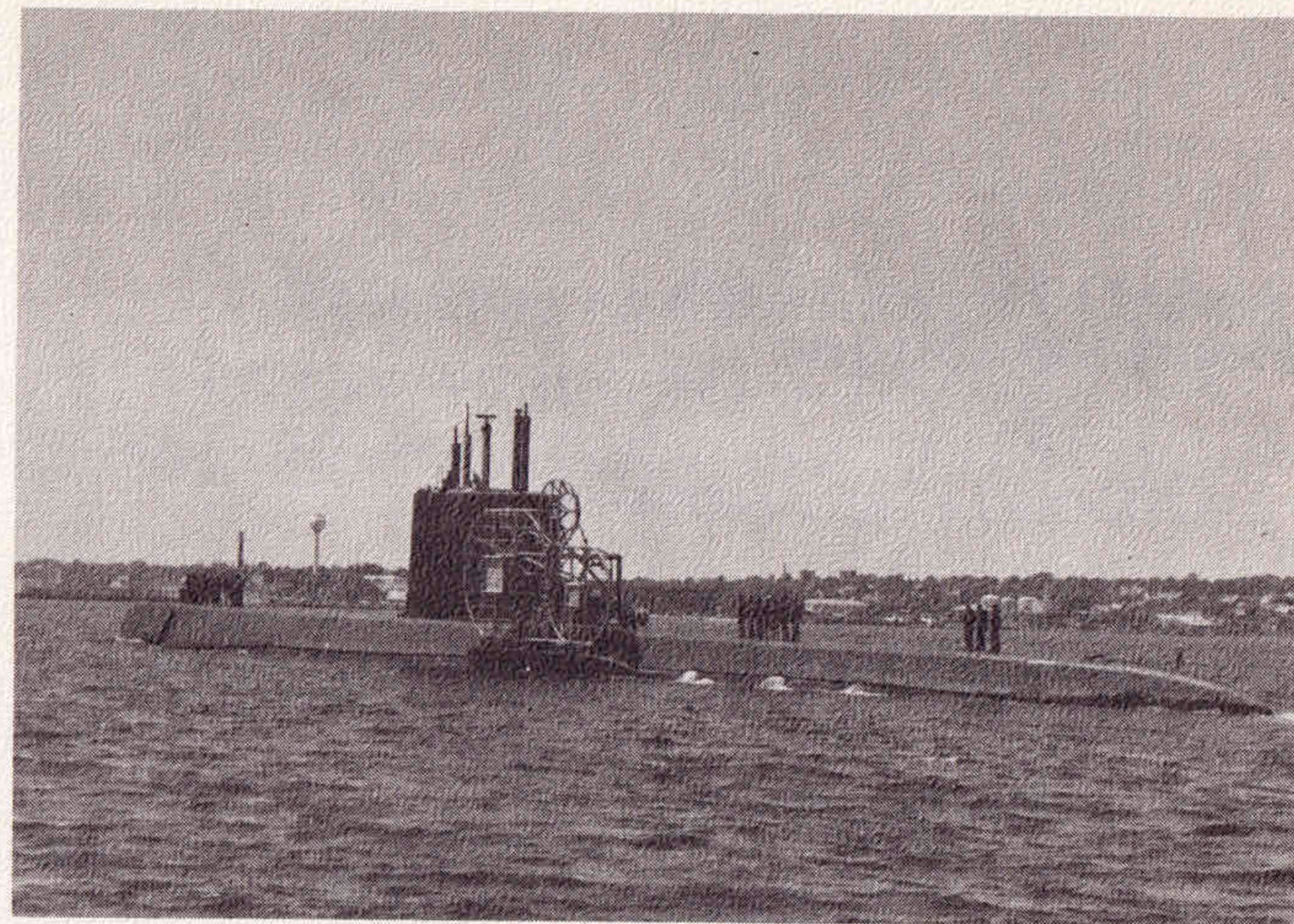
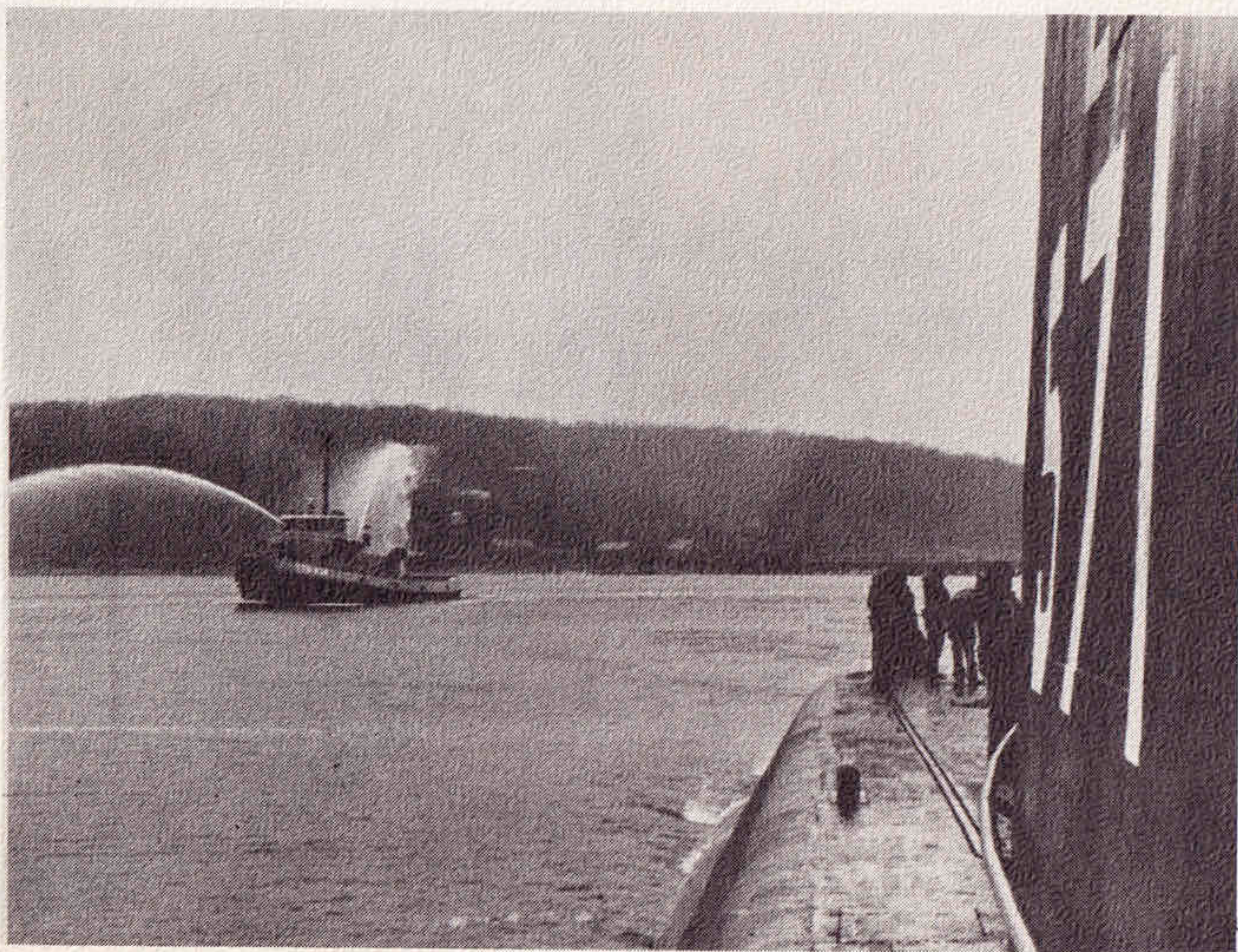
On the 21st of January, 1954, Mrs. Dwight D. EISENHOWER broke the traditional bottle of champagne across the bow as NAUTILUS slid down the ways into the Thames River. NAUTILUS was commissioned on the 30th of September, 1954, at the Electric Boat Division of the General Dynamics Corporation in Groton, Connecticut. After months of construction and dockside testing, on January 17, 1955, at 11:00 a.m., Commander Eugene P. WILKINSON, U.S. Navy, NAUTILUS' first Commanding Officer, ordered all lines cast off and signalled the memorable and historic message: "UNDERWAY ON NUCLEAR POWER."

Once at sea, NAUTILUS demonstrated the phenomenal advance in naval warfare which had resulted from the advent of nuclear power. NAUTILUS established record after record for submerged endurance and speed. More impressive than those records was her revolutionary impact on naval warfare tactics as demonstrated in a series of fleet exercises.



In the summer 1958 NAUTILUS made her epic arctic voyage. On August 3, 1958, while transiting at high speed under the arctic ice pack, NAUTILUS passed through the geographic north pole. This achievement was marked by a message from NAUTILUS' Commanding Officer, Commander William R. ANDERSON, U.S. Navy: "NAUTILUS 90 NORTH." For this voyage NAUTILUS and her crew were awarded the first Presidential Unit Citation to be presented to a ship in peacetime.

During her career NAUTILUS steamed over 510,000 miles and made over 2,500 dives. She deployed to the Mediterranean three times, transited the Panama Canal four times, and visited ports on four continents. She was refueled three times and overhauled three times. Since her last overhaul in 1974, NAUTILUS steamed over 100,000 miles during fleet operations including a Chief of Naval Operations special oceanographic research project.



On April 9, 1979, NAUTILUS departed her homeport of Groton, Connecticut for the final time to begin her voyage to Mare Island Naval Shipyard for decommissioning.

The Navy is currently planning to place NAUTILUS on public display as a national historic ship to be located at the Washington Navy Yard in Washington, D.C.
