## ***The Commissioning Pennant***

*The act of placing a ship in commission marks her entry into active Navy service. At the moment when the commissioning pennant is broken at the masthead, a ship becomes a Navy command in her own right, and takes her place alongside the other active ships of the Fleet.*

*The commissioning pennant is the distinguishing mark of a commissioned Navy ship. A commissioning pennant is a long streamer in some version of the national colors of the Navy that flies it. The American pennant is blue at the hoist, bearing seven white stars; the rest of the pennant consists of single longitudinal stripes of red and white. The pennant is flown at all times as long as a ship is in commissioned status.*

## ***The Inactivation Ceremony***

*Today's ceremony pays tribute to a ship preparing for her decommissioning, the time-honored end of a ship's life. As if decommissioning, the commissioning pennant is hauled down and the watches secured. The solemn ceremony where the commissioning pennant, ensign and jack are hauled down for the last time is a dedication to the total operational success of the ship and men and women who sailed it.*





## The Submariner

*Only a submariner realizes to what great extent an entire ship depends on him as an individual. To a landman this is not understandable, and sometimes it is even difficult for us to comprehend, but it is so!*

*A submarine at sea is a different world in herself, and in consideration of the protracted and distant operations of submarines, the Navy must place responsibility and trust in the hands of those who take such trips to sea.*

*In each submarine there are men who, in the hour of emergency or peril at sea, can turn to each other. The men are ultimately responsible to themselves and each other for all aspects of operation of their submarine. They are the crew. They are the ship.*

*This is perhaps the most difficult and demanding assignment in the Navy. There is not an instant during his tour as a submariner that he can escape the grasp of responsibility. His privileges in view of his obligations are almost ludicrously small, nevertheless, it is the spur which has given the Navy its greatest mariners - the men of the Submarine Service.*

## **The Official Emblem of the USS SALT LAKE CITY (SSN 716)**

One of the many traditions associated with men-of-war throughout time has been the use of a unique emblem to identify the ship. During the initial phases of new construction, the SALT LAKE CITY held a competition to select the ships official emblem.

The emblem selected represents a composite of ideas submitted. The eleven stars represents the eleven battles stars awarded during World War II to USS SALT LAKE CITY (CA-25) the first ship to bear the name. The buildings and mountains represent the major buildings of Salt Lake City and the Wasatch mountains. The seagull represents the saving of the Salt Lake City pioneers crops from a horde of crickets in June of 1848 by a large flock of seagulls.

Born in San Diego, Calif., in June 1948, Admiral Fargo attended high school in Coronado, Calif., and Sasebo, Japan, and graduated from the United States Naval Academy in June 1970.

Trained in joint, naval and submarine commands, Admiral Fargo has served in a variety of sea and shore duty assignments. At sea, his five assignments in both attack and ballistic missile submarines included Executive Officer aboard USS Plunger (SSN 595) and Commanding Officer of USS Salt Lake City (SSN 716). He served as Commander, Submarine Group SEVEN, Commander Task Force SEVEN FOUR, and Commander Task Force ONE FIVE SEVEN in the Western Pacific, Indian Ocean and Arabian Gulf from 1992 to 1993. He commanded the United States FIFTH Fleet and Naval Forces of the Central Command during two years of Iraqi contingency operations from July 1996 to July 1998. Admiral Fargo served as the 29th Commander, United States Pacific Fleet from October 1999 to May 2002.

Ashore, Admiral Fargo has served in the Bureau of Naval Personnel and with the Commander in Chief, U.S. Atlantic Fleet and has had multiple assignments in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations. Since his selection to Flag rank in 1994, Admiral Fargo has served as Director of Operations (J-3), U.S. Atlantic Command during the Haiti intervention; as Director, Assessment Division (N-81) for the Chief of Naval Operations, and Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Plans, Policy and Operations (N3/N5).

Admiral Fargo is a 1989 recipient of the Vice Admiral James Bond Stockdale Award for Inspirational Leadership. His personal decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal (four awards), the Defense Superior Service Medal and the Legion of Merit (three awards).



**REAR ADMIRAL  
JEFFREY CASSIAS  
UNITED STATES NAVY  
COMMANDER, SUBMARINE FORCES, PACIFIC FLEET**

Rear Admiral Cassias graduated from the University of Texas at El Paso in 1974 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry and was commissioned through Officer Candidate School in October 1974.

Rear Adm. Cassias' sea tours included USS HADDOCK (SSN 621), USS PARCHE (SSN 683), USS HAWKBILL (SSN 666), and USS PUFFER (SSN 652). He also served as Anti-Submarine Officer on the staff of Commander, Carrier Group One.

Rear Adm. Cassias served as Commanding Officer, USS BIRMINGHAM (SSN 695) from April 1992 to November 1994. During this tour, BIRMINGHAM completed an Arabian Gulf deployment with the Nimitz Battle Group and a surge deployment to the western Pacific. BIRMINGHAM was awarded the 1992 COMSUBPAC Golden Anchor Award and the 1993 Commander, Submarine Squadron Seven Battle Efficiency "E" award during Rear Adm. Cassias' tour.

Ashore, Rear Adm. Cassias served three tours on the staff of Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet, first as Assistant Combat Systems Training Team Officer and later as a senior member of the Tactical Readiness Evaluation Team and Prospective Commanding Officer Instructor. Rear Adm. Cassias also served as Commander Submarine Squadron 11/Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet Representative West Coast in San Diego, Calif., from 1997 to 1998. He subsequently served as the Executive Assistant to the Director, Force Structure, Resources, and Assessment, J-8, on the Joint Staff.

His first Flag assignment was as Commander Logistics Group, Western Pacific/CTF 73 based in Singapore. Rear Adm. Cassias' previous assignment was as Commander Submarine Group Ten, Commander Submarine Group Two and Commander Navy Region Northeast.

Rear Adm. Cassias is a distinguished graduate of the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, where he received a master's degree in National Resource Strategy in 1999. Rear Adm. Cassias' awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit (six awards), the Meritorious Service Medal, the Navy Commendation Medal (two awards), the Navy Achievement Medal (three awards), and various unit awards.

Captain McLaughlin received his commission from the United States Naval Academy in 1981 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Ocean Engineering. He also has a Masters in Business Administration from the University of Nebraska.

Following nuclear power training and the Submarine Officer Basic Course, he served as Main Propulsion Assistant and Damage Control Assistant in USS GLENARD P. LIPSCOMB (SSN 685) from May 1983 to June 1986.

In March 1987, Captain McLaughlin reported to USS GREENLING (SSN 614) and served as Chemistry/Radiological Controls Assistant until October 1987. Upon completion of this assignment, he attended the Submarine Officer Advanced Course, and reported to USS GROTON (SSN 694) where he served as Engineer Officer from March 1988 to January 1991.

From February 1991 to February 1993, Captain McLaughlin served on the Atlantic Nuclear Propulsion Examining Board. After a brief assignment as Executive Officer on Pre-commissioning Unit HARTFORD (SSN 768), Captain McLaughlin served as Executive Officer on USS DALLAS (SSN 700) from June 1993 to January 1995.

Captain McLaughlin was an Action Officer at United States Strategic Command at Offutt Air Force Base from March 1995 until December 1997. He then commanded USS LA JOLLA (SSN 701) from July 1998 to May 2001. Following command, Captain McLaughlin served as the Submarine Force Atlantic Representative at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard from June 2001 to April 2003.

Captain McLaughlin served at Naval Reactors in Washington D.C. as the Prospective Commanding Officer Instructor and Fleet Technical Assistant to the Deputy Director, Naval Reactors from May 2003 to June 2005.

Captain McLaughlin's decorations include the Legion of Merit, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal with two stars, the Navy Commendation with four stars, the Navy Achievement Medal, and various unit awards.



## COMMANDING OFFICER



### COMMANDER TRACY L. HOWARD UNITED STATES NAVY

Commander Howard is a native of Tupelo, Mississippi, and graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1986 with a Bachelor of Science in Marine Engineering. He completed nuclear power training in Orlando, Florida, and Ballston Spa, New York.

Commander Howard served on the USS GEORGE BANCROFT (SSBN 643) in Charleston, South Carolina, from December 1987 until December 1990 where the ship completed a refueling overhaul, several strategic patrols and earned the Navy Battle Efficiency "E" Award. Following this tour, he was assigned to the Naval Postgraduate School where he earned a Master of Science degree in Operations Research.

Commander Howard was next assigned to the USS BIRMINGHAM (SSN 695) from August 1993 until July 1997 where he served as the Combat Systems Officer and Engineer Officer. During his tour, the ship completed two Western Pacific deployments, including deployment with the NIMITZ Battle Group, and twice received both the Meritorious Unit Commendation and the Navy Battle Efficiency "E" Award. He was next assigned as the Material Officer for Submarine Squadron SEVEN in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, until April 1999.

Commander Howard served as the Executive Officer on USS ALBANY (SSN 753) in Norfolk, Virginia, from July 1999 until August 2001. During this tour, the ship completed a Mediterranean deployment with the GEORGE WASHINGTON Battle Group. He was then assigned to the staff of Commander, Navy Recruiting Command as the Director of Nuclear and Submarine Officer and Enlisted Programs until December 2002.

Commander Howard is entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Medal (two awards), the Navy Commendation Medal (four awards) and the Navy Achievement Medal (three awards).

## USS SALT LAKE CITY (CA 25)




USS SALT LAKE CITY (SSN 716) WAS THE SECOND SHIP OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY TO BE NAMED FOR SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH. THE FIRST SHIP WAS THE USS SALT LAKE CITY (CA-25), A GUN CRUISER. USS SALT LAKE CITY (CA-25) WAS COMMISSIONED IN 1925 AND HAD EARNED MANY PEACETIME MEDALS FOR ITS PERFORMANCE. SALT LAKE CITY WAS RETURNING FROM ESCORTING USS ENTERPRISE TO WAKE ISLAND ON DECEMBER 7, 1941. SALT LAKE CITY IMMEDIATELY BECAME AN INTEGRAL PART OF WORLD WAR II AS A MEMBER OF THE PACIFIC FLEET. SALT LAKE CITY FOUGHT AT NAVAL BATTLES AT WAKE ISLAND, GUADALCANAL, CAPE ESPERANCE, THE ALEUTIANS, GILBERT ISLANDS, MARSHALL ISLANDS, PHILIPPINES, IWO-JIMA, AND OKINAWA. LIKE MANY WARSHIPS AT THE CLOSE FO THE WAR, SALT LAKE CITY WAS ALMOST IMMEDIATELY SLATED FOR DEACTIVATION. THE SHIP WAS ADDED TO THE LIST OF WARSHIPS TO BE USED AS TEST VESSELS FOR THE ATOMIC BOMB AT BIKINI ATOLL IN 1946. SURVIVING TWO ATOMIC BLASTS, IT WAS DECOMMISSIONED ON 29 AUGUST. IT WAS ULTIMATELY SUNK AS A TARGET VESSEL ON 25 MAY 1948 OFF THE COAST OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA.





# HISTORY OF USS SALT LAKE CITY SSN-716



SALT LAKE CITY's keel was laid on the 26<sup>th</sup> of August 1980, and the ship began its waterborne career on the 16<sup>th</sup> of October 1982 when it was launched in Newport News, Virginia. SALT LAKE CITY was commissioned as the 27<sup>th</sup> nuclear submarine on the 12<sup>th</sup> of May 1984 in Norfolk, Virginia.

Following its commissioning in May 1984, SALT LAKE CITY quickly assumed its responsibility to national defense. After completing sea trials, the ship transferred to the Pacific via the Panama Canal.

Briefly assigned to Submarine Group Five in San Diego, SALT LAKE CITY was reassigned to Submarine Squadron Eleven in 1986. From there the SALT LAKE CITY began conducting operations in the western Pacific. After several deployments, SALT LAKE CITY began an extensive depot modernization period at Mare




Island Naval Shipyard and was again assigned to Submarine Group Five. SALT LAKE CITY returned to San Diego but now was assigned to Submarine Squadron Three. Upon decommissioning of Submarine Squadron Three, SALT LAKE CITY was once again assigned to Submarine Squadron Eleven. During its years of service, SALT LAKE CITY completed eight full six-month deployments and several other shorter forward deployed operations.

While conducting operations overseas, SALT LAKE CITY crewmembers have had the opportunity to visit a variety of international ports. Sailors have enjoyed liberty in Japan, Korea, Australia, Philippines, Thailand, Guam, Hong Kong, Singapore, Bahrain, and Saipan.




# USS SALT LAKE CITY (SSN 716)




CNO addresses sailors of Naval Base Point Loma in front of SALT LAKE CITY while conducting an Interim Dry Dock period.

# **SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH**



**Initially, Salt Lake City was ruled by a high council. This council enacted the first municipal ordinances, ratified in a public meeting on January 1, 1848.**

**The unexpected discovery of gold in California in 1848 contributed greatly to Salt Lake City's early growth. The gold rush of 1849 brought a flood of gold seekers through Salt Lake en route to California. These travelers also brought Salt Lake City its first taste of prosperity.**

**As prospectors and speculators raced to the West Coast through Salt Lake City, they brought goods and scarce money with them. Trading became the order of the day. Residents of Salt Lake City supplied the gold rushers with fresh livestock and crops in return for clothing, tools and manufactured goods - treasures from the East Coast.**

**Congress organized the "State of Deseret" into the Utah Territory in 1850. Salt Lake was incorporated as the City of the Great Salt Lake on January 6, 1851 and became the territorial capital in 1856. With the exception of 1851-56 when Fillmore was the legal capital, Salt Lake City has been the capital of Utah.**
